CIFF was first held in 2000 for six days and was attended by 8,000 people. Today, attendance has more than tripled to approximately 28,000 for the 11-day festival. CIFF is now a leader in Western Canada, fostering a local filmmaking culture, promoting volunteerism, encouraging youth education and platforming diverse stories and perspectives.

With Calgary and Alberta emerging as burgeoning filming locations, the 25th edition of CIFF marks a pivotal moment for the festival to be at the forefront of cinematic celebration and representation in the city.

CIFF is a major contributor to youth learning through our Generation Next program.

Launched in 2018 in partnership with the Calgary Board of Education, Generation Next has engaged over 5200 students since its inception. This has included field trips, subsidized bussing, local youth selecting films for the general public, and so much more. It opened up new avenues of learning for teachers to engage students, sparked careers for youth who didn't realize it was an option for them, and fostered an understanding of the value of authentic storytelling.

OUR VISION

CIFF is one of the largest film festivals in Canada, but we're not ready to stop there. Our vision transforms the landscape of downtown Calgary, drives collaboration within the arts ecosystem and showcases Calgary's unique cultural corridor.

With the confirmed closure of Eau Claire Market, including the Cineplex in May of 2024, we knew we had to adapt to the closure of our long-term festival multiplex. We also acknowledged that the Globe's 'for sale' status represents an existential risk to the cinematic arts in downtown Calgary and, therefore, a risk to the overall vibrancy of our city's core. We saw this change coming and have spent the past 2 years developing a vision that mitigates the risks and contributes to enhance our cultural community in a way never imagined.

A NEW CONSTELLATION OF VENUES

Calgary's downtown corridor is among the most remarkable in North America.

Our vision for the future includes an incredible string of art and theatre venues, convertible spaces, public plazas, and amenities.

In 2024 CIFF will begin the first phase of a new venue strategy that will ensure the sustainability of the festival for years to come. The old strategy was a Hub model, wherein the Eau Claire multiplex was central, and any other venues felt like a satellite. In contrast, the new model is a Constellation of many downtown venues, each with one to two screens, connecting and animating downtown. Many international film festivals thrive using this model, such as TIFF, VIFF and Sundance.

Every year, we'll acquire more of the equipment and technology required to transform spaces, allowing us to bring additional downtown venues online, growing the constellation of venues gradually until we've lit up the entire downtown, creating a festival district that rivals the best in Canada, if not the world.

The assets required to create cinematic spaces will not remain warehoused when not in use by CIFF. Instead, they will remain harboured at partner venues, thereby increasing the screening capacity for the entire arts ecosystem and placing film at the nexus of connection and collaboration in the cultural industries.
